Board of Forestry Approves Changes to Forest Practices Act

On October 26th, the Oregon Board of Forestry approved more than 100 changes to the Oregon Forest Practices Act (OFPA), resulting from the landmark compromise agreement – The Private Forest Accord (PFA). The PFA was signed in 2021, memorializes the agreements made between representatives of Oregon's timber industry, small woodland owners, and conservation and fisheries groups that set forth future changes to the OFPA. These mediated discussions sought to bring constructive discussion and determine the best approach to mitigate impacts of forest management on streams and fish which establishing regulatory certainty.



Coming Changes to the Oregon Forest Practices Act Include:

- **Riparian Areas** New and wider stream buffers to protect and support salmon, steelhead, bull trout, and amphibians
- Steep Slopes Specific rules related to harvesting on steep slopes
- **Forest Roads** Updated standards for fish-bearing stream culvert sizes and instillation procedures, as well as road building rules for minimizing sediment in streams. There will also be a required assessment of road conditions prior to filing a notice of operations
- **Adaptive Management** All future changes to the OFPA will be coordinated by a new Adaptive Management Program that will advise the Board of Forestry

Recent legislation also directed the Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) to establish a Small Forestland Owners (SFO) Assistance Office, which will provide aid to small forestland owners in understanding and following these new regulations. The SFO Office will also provide technical assistance, supporting services, and administer new incentive programs – the Small Forestland Investment in Stream Habitat (SFISH) and the Forest Conservation Tax Credit. ODF is currently hiring to fill these new positions.

OSWA leaders and volunteers will continue to monitor this process and provide input. The Oregon Forest Resources Institute (OFRI) and the Partnership for Forestry Education (PFF) are currently developing new materials and will be offering trainings in the near future. OSWA and the Chapters will be crucial for helping small woodland owners obtain and understand these materials and the impacts of these changes.

Fall-to-Winter on the Tree Farm

Fire season is over and bark beetles are no longer active so now is the time to get out and finish those projects you've been waiting to complete. The days may be short, and the weather isn't always cooperating, but the fall and early winter months are an excellent time to get a few key things checked off your to-do list. Here are just a few items to think about:

November

- ✓ Winterize and complete maintenance on your equipment. Be sure to drain hoses and pumps, sharpen tools, drain fuel out of power tools, check antifreeze levels, and make sure everything is clean and free of mud or other debris.
- ✓ Now is a great time to prune or thin around your home or property. Especially for pine species, bark beetle species are now inactive for the winter. But be sure to treat pine slash before next April.
- ✓ Burn your slash piles when conditions allow. Be sure to check with the Oregon Department of Forestry before ignition.
- ✓ Consult your accountant to plan your year-end tax strategies.
- Check culverts and evaluate your road drainage. Good, clear ditches, water bars, and culverts can prevent washouts over the winter. Damage can be costly and degrade water quality, so prepare now.

December

- Review your accomplishments and reaffirm your tree farm goals and objectives. Inspect your forest and don't forget to take photos.
- ✓ Complete your record-keeping for 2022 and confirm all of your 2023 plans are in place.
- ✓ Refresh your property boundaries and signage as necessary.
- ✓ Renew your association memberships.

January

- ✓ Confirm your 2023 plans by contacting contractors, consultants, and make sure any necessary permits are in place.
- ✓ If the ground is frozen, it could be a good time to conduct a ground-based logging operations to reduce soil compaction and risk of fire.
- ✓ The winter months can be a good time for cruising, road layout, marking trees, and establishing inventory plots.
- Monitor nesting activity so you can protect or improve habitat and avoid disturbing wildlife while they are sensitive.


