

Neighbor to Neighbor Tour & Annual Meeting

Join us for the first ever joint tour with the Pine Valley Firewise Community! Our first big event of 2023 will be a "Neighbor to Neighbor" Tour where small woodland owners and Firewise community members will visit two local landowner's properties. This event will also include the 2nd NEOSWA Annual Meeting. Mark your calendars for Saturday, May 20th, for the opportunity to learn about forestry, natural resources, and fire-related topics from a number of speakers.

Tour Stops

Mary Camby & Anne Andreucci – These two sisters own 40-acres, with 26-acres of timber, across Clear Creek outside of Halfway. Mary has owned the property since 2003, and Anne joined in 2018. It is bordered by USFS to the east, private property to the north and south, and by Clear Creek Road to the west. While the property has not be affected by wildfire, it was heavily impacted by a 100-year flood of Clear Creek in 2010. This flood resulted in erosion, sediment deposits, and damage to the road bordering the creek. Access is challenging, and therefore no harvesting has occurred (yet) under their ownership. Their primary focus is to maintain and improve wildlife habitat on the property especially in the riparian area along Clear Creek



Details

The event will begin and end at Lions Hall in Halfway. We will travel to our tour stops via bus and carpool, before returning for our Annual Meeting. Coffee and breakfast food, and a catered lunch from "Cow Camp" food truck, will be provided. The tour will be outdoors, rain or shine, and will require moderate walking/hiking so please dress accordingly. Admission is *free*, but registration is *required*.

Nominations Due – Recognize Tree Farmers & Volunteers

Oregon Tree Farm System (OTFS)

It's time to nominate candidates for the 2023 Oregon Tree Farmer of the Year! This program recognizes the outstanding efforts of Tree Farmers at the *County* level. Following their selection, County winners are nominated for State Tree Farmer of the Year. The Oregon Tree Farmer of the Year then becomes eligible for recognition by the American Tree Farm System through Regional and National Awards. To be eligible for nomination, landowners must be certified by the Oregon Tree Farm System. Nominations are due *June 1, 2023*.



Oregon Small Woodlands Association (OSWA)

It's also time to nominate two awards for OSWA: Chapter Volunteer of the Year and Chapter Tree Farmer of the Year! These awards recognize the outstanding efforts at the *Chapter* level for both a volunteer who has made the extra effort to support the Chapter as well as a Tree Farmer. Note, the OSWA Tree Farmer award is *separate* from the OTFS award, however the nomination may be the same. Nomination information for these awards *is coming soon*.
