# New Forest Practices Rules Go into Effect January 1, 2024

New regulations under the Oregon Forest Practices Act (OFPA) will go into effect for all private forestland owners starting January 1, 2024. These new rules were the result of the Private Forest Accord, an agreement between 13 conservation and fisheries groups, 11 timber companies, and OSWA, signed in 2021. Below are the key things to know, as well as a summary of some of the new rules, to help you prepare:

- All 2023 notifications must be completed by December 31, 2023. All forest operations on or after January 1, 2024, will require a new E-Notification (FERNS).
- Road Condition Assessments (RCA) are required starting January 1, 2024, for small forestland owners, and must be submitted along with harvest notifications.
- Starting in 2024, all landowners must report completion of notified activities by the end of the calendar year, or within 90 days for small forestland owners if certain conditions are met.

#### Forest Roads

New rules related to forest roads focus on minimizing sediment from entering streams and unimpeded fish passage. This includes minimizing hydrologic connectivity, such as a road ditch that runs directly into a stream. Further, this also includes additional rules for planning, design, and construction of new fish passages, as well as for improving existing passages. Small Forestland Owners (SFOs), or landowners who own less than 5,000 acres and have harvested no more than an average of 2 MMBF/year over the past 3 years, will also be required to submit a Road Condition Assessment (RCA).

RCAs are intended to ensure forest roads to be used are in compliance with the new Forest Practices Act standards. These assessments evaluate current road conditions as related to sediment delivery, document water crossings, and identify abandoned roads, fish passage barriers, and potential hazards to fish-bearing streams. RCAs must be completed when submitting a notification of operation that includes timber harvesting or when applying for a grant through the Small Forestland Investment in Stream Habitat (SFISH) program. Assessments must be conducted on existing roads where the harvest activity will take place.


#### Stream Protection

Riparian Management Areas (RMA) are determined based on the stream type, which includes stream size (large, medium, small), seasonality (perennial or seasonal), fish-bearing status (fish-bearing, non-fish-bearing, and fish-bearing inhabited by salmon, steelhead, or bull trout [SSBT]), and the stream type that the respective stream flows into. The new stream vegetation retention rules are different based on two geographic regions: eastern and western Oregon. Qualified small forest landowners may choose to either follow the standard practice option, required for large forest landowners (>5,000 acres), or follow a "minimum option" which leaves narrower no-cut buffers along streams.

For eastern Oregon, RMAs generally require inner and outer protection zones that restrict or prohibit timber harvesting along all fish-bearing streams, and along large and medium non-fish-bearing streams. RMAs also include an Equipment Limitation Zone (ELZ), where disturbance must be minimized within 30-feet of either

side of a stream, and a Retention Equipment Limitation Zone (R-ELZ), which includes the same 30-foot ELZ but requires all shrubs and trees less than 6 inches diameter at breast height to be retained where possible.

The Oregon Forest Resources Institute (OFRI) is currently developing a set of diagrams to help eastern Oregon private forestland owners follow these new rules. The *Eastside Forest Stream Protection Diagrams* booklet details and illustrates the required widths of no-cut buffers and equipment limitation zones along different types of streams for every possible scenario. This publication will be available soon.



#### OFPA Assistance & Where to Learn More

The Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF), as well as partners such as OFRI and OSU Extension, are currently developing resources and training to assist landowners with implementing these new rules. ODF has factsheets and training videos available on their website, as well as hard copies of the new rules available at local ODF offices. 
### Additional Chapters:

#### **Welcome Brian Rabe - New NEOSWA Treasurer**

I am a semi-retired consulting soil scientist. I worked for Valley Science and Engineering (formerly known as Cascade Earth Sciences, Ltd) for over 35 years based in Albany, Oregon. My wife, Dayla, and I purchased 380 acres in 2007 and added an adjacent 266 acres in 2009 located a couple miles south off Highway 7 in the Denny Creek watershed in Baker County. We have been members of OSWA since 2011 and officially became a Certified Tree Farm in 2015 just a few weeks before the Cornet-Windy Ridge fire scorched our eastern 240 acres. Led by Lane Parry and his crew, a salvage operation was conducted on about 25 acres along Denny Creek Road during the winter and about 19 acres were replanted in the spring of 2016 that included ponderosa pine, western larch, and Douglas-fir. In 2021, we received a grant from ODF to conduct targeted fuel reduction thinning along selected property boundaries and roadways, managed by Lane and conducted by Josh Cobb. We purchased 5 acres east of Goodrich Creek Lane



about 10 miles northwest of Baker City in 2016 and moved into our new house in July 2022. As I ease into retirement, I plan to invest more time at the Tree Farm as well as the serveral organizations I belong to.
